PROGRAM

Barbara Glickman, author of <u>Capitol Splendor: Gardens and Parks of Washington</u>, DC, a book that described 32 gardens in the DC area. During her slide presentation, Ms. Glickman mentioned 10 notable gardens: Dumbarton Oaks, Huntly Meadows, Brookside gardens, Chesapeake & Ohio, National Arboretum, Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens, Meadowlark Gardens, and the Enid Haupt Garden at the Smithsonian.

She also gave examples of the history and landscape design of a formal Italian designed garden at Meridian Hill Park, which features statues, water features, and symmetry in patterns of plantings. AnnMarie Garden is an example of the French designed garden, which controls nature with trees pruned in geometric shapes, and gravel paths. The garden "rooms" at Hillwood and Dunbarton Oaks were illustrated. The various gardens of the Smithsonian were also noted: the Bartholdi Garden and the various small gardens within the US Botanic Garden: the garden court, the jungle, the desert, the National Garden roses, and the First Ladies garden.
