The National Capital Area of State Garden Clubs, Inc., is offering a two-day Gardening School class in Northern Virginia November 14-15.

It is one of four in a series -- this is Class III of Gardening Schools. You do not need to take classes in order. Once you have taken two, you can join in what is now Gardening Consultants Council and Environmental Studies Council (GCC-ECC).

The classes will meet at Merrifield Garden Center Fair Oaks location from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Thursday and Friday, with an exam on Friday at 4 p.m.

On Thursday morning, the class will carpool to Meadowlark for a botanical garden tour.

Topics covered include houseplants, plant growth, culinary herbs, new plant development, and outdoor container gardening.

Registration is now open and the registration form is on the NCAGC website. Registration deadline is before November 8. Cost to National Garden Club members is \$90 for the full course. Members of GCC-ECC may refresh at a cost of \$90.


Gardens Across America - May 24 - October 1, 2019
