

ANNUAL PICNIC

We all feasted on the sumptuous dishes provided by the ladies, and enjoyed a Mini Flower Show in which specimens of horticulture from the gardens of some of the ladies were displayed. The judging was done by our fellow member and Master Accredited Flower Show Judge Anne DeBoeser, who critiqued the entries, and told us how much they line up with the Standards of a Flower Show. Iona Black came away with the Blue Ribbon.





BLUE RIBBONS: Four of the ladies from the club entered the Flower Show of the Prince George's County Fair held September 6-9, 2012 and all were awarded blue ribbons for their horticulture submissions. Lorraine Leonard entered a Lobelia Siphilitica specimen, Arminta Donovan an Acuba Japonica, Sonia Johnson a Cosmos Sulphureus, and Julie Harrison a Citronella plant and a Lantana for which she won two blue ribbons. Lorraine also came away with a white ribbon for her vegetable arrangement around the theme "A Chicken in every Pot". Carrots, celery and onion made up her arrangement.

PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

The new season started with a BANG! The meeting in September was held at the home of Esther Neckere. Guest speaker Ann Young, Master Gardener gave a stimulating talk on Herb Gardening. We were treated to samples of Aloe, Variegated Sage, Boxwood Basil, Dill, Oregano and Chive. Emphasis was placed on recipes in which these herbs can be incorporated such as Vinegar and Chive. If we consider planting these herbs from seeds, it was suggested that pouring boiling water over the soil aids in sterilization.

HORTICULTURE: Chairman Jessica Sherlock gave us an eye opening talk on the history of some Heirloom Plants, and the reasons for their introduction. The English Ivy was selected, and it was pointed out that this plant served as a thermal shield for houses, which insulated them against the heat in the summer and the cold in the winter. To grow Heirloom Ivy, one has to train it. English Ivy is not now recommended for planting on the structures of buildings.

CONSERVATION: Chairman Diana Morse opened the new season with an interesting presentation on "Invasive Species" which will cover plants and animals. Diana pointed to invasive plants such as Garlic Mustard, Periwinkle, English Ivy and Purple Loosestrife. She suggested education as still a vehicle to stem the introduction of these species into the environment.


ABOUT ARBOR HOUSE

Fall Gardening Checklist:

a) Fall is the best time to repair, re-plant, and renovate your lawn. Seeding, fertilizing, adding lime, dethatching and core aerating are all good fall projects.

- b) Plant spring blooming bulbs in November if possible. As long as the ground is not frozen, it is not too late to plant.
- c) Treat houseplants that had been moved outdoors with an insecticide just before moving them indoors.
- d) Dig up tender summer bulbs like Cannas and Elephant ears, remove soil, pack loosely in peat moss in paper bags with holes, and store in a cool (not freezing) and dark location until it's time to plant again in late April next year.
